Each state also has its own flag, motto and culture.


The USA can also be split into six regions which have different landscapes and climates.

Physical Features

There are three main mountain ranges in the USA: the Appalachian Mountains (many states in the south west region), the Rocky Mountains (Colorado) and the Sierra Nevada (California). The Rockies are the highest mountains and run along the whole country from north to south.

Around a third of all the land in the USA is prairie land. Prairies are flat areas that consist mainly of grasses and wild flowers as opposed to trees.

There are four deserts in the USA: the Great Basin Desert, the Mojave Desert, the Sonoran Desert and the Chihuahua Desert.

Natural Phenomena

There are natural phenomena that occur in some parts of America that can make living in certain places difficult. Blizzards are severe snowstorms where there are low temperatures, fast winds and lots of blowing snow.

A tornado (also known as a twister) is a spiralling funnel of air which descends from a storm cloud to the ground. Tornadoes are formed when warm air meets cold air, which causes the air to twist around. This creates a vortex which then descends to the ground.

A hurricane is a tropical storm that starts in the Atlantic Ocean. They last much longer than tornadoes and can cause even more damage.

Earthquakes happen when the plates get jammed together. The forces pushing the rocks together then build up until the rocks distort.
