Timeline of Events

1905

Annie Kenney and Christabel Pankhurst disrupted a meeting, were arrested.

1918

All men over the age of 21 were now able to vote in a general election. Married women over the age of 30 could vote too as long as they or their husbands owned or rented property.

1953

Annie Kenney died knowing that they achieved votes for women.

1879

Annie Kenney was born in Springhead, Oldham.

Before 1918, women weren't allowed to vote at all.

1928

The voting age for men and women was the same.

2018

Annie Kenney's statue was unveiled outside the town hall in Oldham.

She was one of twelve children.

Annie Kenney was born in 1879 in Springhead, Oldham.

Annie worked in a cotton mill from the age of 10.



She loved reading books.

In December 2018, her statue was unveiled outside Oldham Town Hall.

She died in 1953 knowing that the suffragettes had achieved votes for women.
